## Vision:

# **Mandate:**

- b) to establish, maintain and promote standards of the practice of midwifery,
- c) to establish, maintain, develop and promote standards of professional ethics in the practice of midwifery.

# **Executive Summary**

This is the fifth annual report for the Midwifery Council of New Brunswick/Conseil de l'Ordre des sages-femmes du Nouveau-Brunswick (MCNB) and captures the work and activities of the Council between April 1<sup>st</sup>, 2020 – March 31<sup>st</sup>, 2021.

### The primary activities of the MCNB were;

- Governance development of policies, development of an orientation for new member and installation of new members.
- Registration and renewal of registration of midwives.
- Continued involvement with the Canadian Midwifery Regulators Council (CMRC) with the Registrar as a Director as well as the Chair of the Registration Affairs Committee.
- Meeting with the Minister of Health regarding engagement of the discussion paper "Striving for Dependable Health Care".

The Midwifery Council met 8 times this year, including the Annual General Meeting (AGM) in June 2020, with an average meeting length of 80 minutes.

# **Future Directions**

The Midwifery Council has identified the following solutions to advance midwifery practice in the province by:

- Adding more midwifery positions across the province thereby increasing access to primary health care. Since 2017, a total of 369 families from across the province have sought out midwifery care, yet unable to access it.<sup>1</sup>
- Investing in midwifery university program seats to help new graduates return home to practice in New Brunswick. Allowing midwifery students to undertake their clinical placements in New Brunswick under the supervision of registered midwives encourages recruitment and retention.
- Implementing the second attendant program.
- Expanding the midwifery scope of practice to include reproductive health care for women of all ages including; pap tests, STI testing, contraceptive care, breast exams and IUD insertion.
- Aligning and supporting other Government programs including the Baby-Friendly Initiative (BFI), Food for All NB and the Wellness Movement which directly impacts those of priority populations.

- Allowing for Indigenous Midwifery and returning birth practices to Indigenous communities thereby working towards Reconciliation.<sup>2</sup>
- Enabling Act amendments to allow self-regulation and address gaps noted above.

In March 2021, the Midwifery Council presented these points above to the Minister of Health in response to the discussion paper "Striving for Dependable Health Care" and attended a virtual meeting with the Minister in conjunction with the NBHPRN.

The Fredericton Midwifery Program is presently being evaluated by Government, which is anticipated to take a year. Upon completion, MCNB anticipates further direction for midwifery in New Brunswick.

As the foundational work of the Midwifery Council has been established, plans to engage in governance training in the upcoming year as we integrate new members and further our learning as a Council.

## **Complaints Committee:**

A roster of persons willing to serve on this committee and approved by Council, will be kept by the Registrar in order to ensure procedural fairness.

Mandate: A person may make a complaint in writing to the Registrar of a registered midwife. The Registrar shall refer the complaint to the Complaints Committee, if the conduct or actions complained of may constitute professional misconduct, incompetence or incapacity. Section 39(3) Midwifery Act.

➤ No complaints received. The Complaints committee did not need to convene this year.

### **Discipline Committee:**

A roster of persons willing to serve on this committee and approved by Council, will be kept by the Registrar in order to ensure procedural fairness.

The Discipline Committee may receive allegations from the Complaints committee. A hearing may be held. Direction would then be provided to the Registrar regarding the registered midwife's registration.

➤ No complaints received, and the Discipline committee did not need to convene this year.


